Low-income residents in North Norfolk may be eligible for energy efficiency works. If a resident homeowner who has a household income of £30,000 or less, less than £50,000 in savings and an EPC of E, F or G they may be eligible for a fully funded grants that covers the below measures – Internal wall insulation, External wall insulation, Loft insulation, Cavity wall insulation, Roof in roof / flat roof insulation; Air source heat pump If you are a tenant and fit the criteria you may be eligible for a grant that covers up to 65% of the costs. Keep Warmth In and Draughts Out!

Much of the UK housing stock is old (more than a third pre-War, almost a half were built between 1945-1990. and less than a sixth after 1990). Although many houses have been improved over the years, old houses are more likely to be poorly insulated and draughty. British buildings produce about a fifth of the UK's carbon emissions, so if we are to achieve the UK's goal of net zero emissions by 2050, it is essential to improve insulation and draft-proofing (as well as other energysaving measures) in the home.

Heat rises, so we need to stop it escaping through the roof. 270mm and 300mm of loft insulation (fibreglass, mineral wool, or various eco-friendly and effective alternatives) when placed between and above the joists is recommended. According to the Energy Saving Trust, new insulation typically costs about £630 for a detached house and saves £590 per year. It also reduces emissions by 1,000kg CO2/year. Topping up existing loft insulation (from 120mm to 270mm) for a similar house costs £480, saves £55, and reduces emissions by 95kg CO2/year. DIY is cheaper. However, damp lofts and flat roofs need to be insulated by professionals. When insulated, lofts can become very cold so any pipes and water tanks above the insulation will need lagging.

Attic rooms can be insulated between the roof and the plasterboard ceiling. Cavity walls can be insulated by injecting insulation into the cavity - also a job for qualified professionals. Other walls can be insulated too, but this is more costly.

Double-glazing is a sure way of preventing heat loss and draughts from windows - but it is expensive. Secondary glazing isn't as effective (and might cause rot in wooden frames).

Replacing doors and windows is an expensive option. However, there are quite a lot of simple and cheaper measures to take to reduce draughts and heat leakage, such as – keeping doors shut in winter, using insulating strips on windows and doors, door sausages, thick curtains over draughty doors and windows. For more

money-saving and carbon-reducing ideas about keeping warmth in and draughts out, look out for the December display on the Kettlestone bus shelter notice board. You can also email us for a list of ideas.

It's important to remember that improved insulation requires ventilation to prevent mould and to remove moisture, smoke, cooking odours, and indoor pollutants.

To identify exactly where our homes are losing their warmth, we can use thermal imaging cameras in every room or space to identify any cold spots, draughts, and damp patches. If you are interested in using a thermal imaging camera in your home, please let us know. If enough people are interested, we will be investigating ways to do this in our community at a reasonable cost.
