Farmers may be fuming, but they're still farming for the future

Businesses need stability and a degree of certainty. As do most of us. It enables us to plan for the future. And, especially when your business is capital intensive, you don't want to outlay lots of cash unless you are sure that this future is going to be at least a bit similar to the past, or, if it is going to change, then you know well in advance what the change is going to be.

And if, like farmers, some of your income comes from government support, then you need the government to signal any changes well in advance and stick to what they say.

Farmers were promised greater financial support for taking action to help the environment and provide other 'social benefits' such as access for walking. But the government's Environmental Land Management scheme is having what might politely be called 'teething troubles'. As EDP reported in September:

The National Farmers' Union says the industry has been left in 'a perilous place' as the old land-based Basic Payment Scheme is being phased out before the replacement Sustainable Farming Incentive (SFI) is fully in place.

But some farmers' commitment to the environment and to creating 'public goods' continues despite the funding uncertainties. Groups such as the Nature Friendly Farming Network are championing new ways of farming that not only gives us healthy food but also protects and enhances the natural world. Certification schemes such as Fair to Nature endorse products that are environmentally sound and support committed businesses.



Many farmers are dedicated conservationists whose passion and commitment to the natural world is second-to-none. But for years the subsidy system has not supported them, pushing farmers to produce food regardless of the cost to the natural world and to the physical and mental health of human beings, who are (of course) part of nature and need the support of the environment around them to survive and thrive.

When the new subsidy system eventually gets working it will support positive changes. The Government's <u>Sustainable Farming Incentive</u> (for England):

will pay farmers to adopt and maintain sustainable farming practices that can protect and enhance the natural environment alongside food production, and also support farm productivity (including by improving animal health and welfare, optimising the use of inputs and making better use of natural resources).

Fine words. But time is short and the need is great.
